Our nokotsudo was also a mess. Vases, flowers, and incense holders, as well as several urns and ihai tumbled to the floor. Everything was respectfully cleaned up by Chirio Miyose, Miyeko Miyose, Yoshiko Ikeda, Michael Nakade, Ryan Nakade, and Jiko Sensei. Please check your family niche and report any missing items to Rev. Jiko. Some urns and ihai were slightly damaged, but the contents of the urns were all contained.

Our social hall and kitchen suffered minimal damage and were cleaned up by Chirio and Miyeko Miyose and Michael Nakade. There was some damage to the ceiling of the Hisashi Kimura Cultural Hall which will have to be repaired, but the hall was inspected and found safe to use.

The stonewall bordering the highway crumbled in several places and the temple board will be meeting to determine its repair.



The concrete steps leading to the minister's residence cracked on both sides, but fortunately the residence, Buddha Hall, and Kannon Hall withstood the earthquake well. Amazingly, none of the Buddhas, Kannonsamas, or Founders toppled over or were damaged. For this we can be truly thankful.

Baer and Jane Ikeda were picking coffee on the slope mauka of the temple when the earthquake struck and saw our temple shaking violently before their eyes. Rev. Jiko was attending meetings in Honolulu that weekend and didn't return until the afternoon, but Mike, Ryan, Chirio, and Miyeko took good care of our temple that day. Arigato.

Thank you also to concerned members & Dharma friends who called from near and far away. We even received a call from the Soto Shu head office in Tokyo.

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# Kona Daifukuji Taiko Group Says Mahalo

The Kona Daifukuji Taiko group and families send our heartfelt thank you to all who helped in any way to send us to Japan. We had an unforgettable trip!

We were on the coast of the Sea of Japan most of the trip. With the help of Mike Nakade interpreting and having family ties, we had some very special times. We arrived in Nagoya after flying in a double-decker JAL. We rode the subway, toured the Nagoya Castle, and the Toyota Museum within the first 24 hours of our arrival in Nagoya, Japan. From there we went to Fukui Prefecture where we toured an atomic energy plant, a kamboko fishcake factory, the scenic Tojimbo cliffs, and saw the beauty and felt the presence of Eiheiji Monastery. Also in Fukui, we were invited to Mike's parents' house, ate at his cousin's restaurant, stayed at his classmate's charming, hospitable inn for two nights, and went to a public hot spring (onsen) facility. With our very competent driver, we rode the bus along the beautiful coast and through the forested mountains. There were fields of rice. buckwheat, and many gardens. We watched and played with the awe-inspiring taiko group Otaiko Za Myojin.

From Fukui we headed north to Niigata. On the way, we stopped at the Asano Taiko Museum where we saw the trees out of which taiko are made. A highlight was seeing and spending time with the Tamiyas in Niigata city. They are all well and send their love. Their temple is tucked in, just off the sidewalk, on a city block. We performed in a park for over 60 of Sky's schoolmates. The children all wore different colored caps of blue, green, and yellow. Sky is 5 years old and will enter elementary school as a first grader in April, 2007.

From Niigata we rode the bullet train to Tokyo where we had our first cold, windy, rainy day. We visited the famous Sensoji Temple in Asakusa, a very busy, big temple. A huge red lantern hangs in front near the Thunder Gates. We even saw a statue and paintings of the Thunder god who is on our Daifukuji taiko tshirts. After getting some shopping done in Tokyo, it was time to head to the airport in Narita. Arriving back in Kona, we were mighty surprised by our families holding a big banner welcoming us home. What an ending to a very memorable trip that opened our hearts and minds!

# Thanksgiving Greetings from Jiko Sensei

Dear Members and Dharma Friends, Happy Thanksgiving!

The recent earthquake did more than rattle our houses – it rattled our nerves, as well. I hope that you and your homes are all okay. Many of you have told me how you reflected upon the Buddha's teachings on impermanence and attachment while you were sweeping up the pieces of your precious china and antiques. With the earthquake came a reminder of the power of nature, the reality of impermanence, and the wisdom of letting go. "I have fewer possessions now," one woman told me. "I feel lighter."

During the days following the earthquake, friends greeted friends, saying "Nice to see you again" and truly meaning it. Pets that had bolted in fear and stayed away for a few days returned home and were welcomed with much love. Feelings of fear and anxiety are gradually settling, and many are feeling the pure joy of simply being alive. Life is precious – it's as simple as that—but sometimes it takes a big earthquake to shake us out of our slumber.

Now comes the task of repairing and rebuilding, with neighbor helping neighbor. I am hoping that our Sangha members will step forward to help put our cemetery back together again. There is much work to be done there, and the work must be done with much respect and care. I am sure that our temple board will provide us with much-needed guidance as they have done in the past.

Everyone, please put down your coffee baskets for a couple of hours and come out to our Thanksgiving service and general membership meeting on November 19 at 9:30 am. This meeting is usually held at the time of Jodo-E in

December, but this year Rev. Earl Ikeda and members of the Puna Hongwanji Mission will be joining our Bodhi Day service and luncheon. For this reason, we are holding the general membership meeting this month. Please join us.

At the Darumaki & Eitaikyo service I talked about the meaning of Sangha, saying that our community of Buddhists is one of the Three Treasures -- not no. 3 in priority, but one of the Three Refuges, and equal in importance to the Buddha and the Dharma. In the months ahead, we will be celebrating the Sangha in broad and exciting ways. At the Thanksgiving Eve Interfaith Service at the Kona Hongwanji on Nov. 22, our Sangha will be made up of friends from the various religious faiths found in our Kona community. On December 3, our Sangha will be the coming together of Daifukuji and Hongwanji members and friends in order to celebrate what is dear and precious to all of us -- the enlightenment of Shakyamuni Buddha. And, when we begin the New Year 2007, we at Daifukuji will have the honor of hosting on January 6th the first Big Island gathering of the Hawaii Association of International Buddhists. Then "our Sangha" will be made up of Dharma friends from all Buddhist traditions around the island. Like the stonewalls that crumbled in the earthquake, the walls that have separated Buddhist groups from each other are also crumbling, and out of the rubble will arise a new Sangha body, one without walls.

"Let the Sangha body be my body" said Vietnamese Zen Master Thich Nhat Hanh, who also thinks that the buddha to come, Maitreya, the Buddha of loving-kindness, may not be an individual, but rather a great Sangha of individuals who will practice the ways of loving-kindness and bring peace and stability to the Earth.

Dear members and friends, I wish you and your families a warm and happy Thanksgiving and invite you to become active members of our Sangha.
