Pari-Nirvana Nehan-E Service Sunday, February 8 9:30 a.m. Potluck Lunch

"Seeking the way, you must exert yourselves and strive with diligence. It is not enough to have seen me. Walk as I have advised you. Free yourselves from the tangled net of sorrow. Walk in the path with steadfast aim."

After saying these words, Shakyamuni Buddha passed away on February 15th at the age of 80 in the Sala grove near the Badha River in the suburb of Kusinara, India. This day is called Pari-Nirvana Day.

A Pari-Nirvana Nehan-e service will be held on Sunday, February 8 at 9:30 a.m. In observance of the Buddha's passing, a magnificent scroll depicting the reclining Buddha surrounded by mourning people and animals will be hung inside the temple. The Dharma talk will be given by the Reverend Jiko Nakade.

Lunch will be a potluck, so please bring a dish to share. During lunch, there will be a slideshow presentation of last year's temple events. Please join us!

Library News
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The

significant new book in the library is
"A Guide to the Bodhisattva Way of Life" by Santideva. It has been a very important book in Buddhism for the last thirteen centuries, and is extremely easy to read, being composed mostly of one- or two-sentence aphorisms, much like the Dhammapada.

Another wonderful new book is "Lady of the Lotus-Born: The Life and Enlightenment of Yeshe Tsogyal" by Changchub and Nyingpo. This is the story of the first Tibetan to obtain complete enlightenment. She was the closest disciple of Padmasambhava, the master who introduced Buddhism to Tibet. It's not only a biography, but an inspiring example of how Buddha's teaching may be practiced.

We've received three new graphically illustrated books, appropriate for all ages except the very youngest. "Buddha for Beginners" by Asma is perfect for teenagers or older. It's a somewhat quick read with more picture than writing on every page. It's from England, and has a fresh approach and even a touch of attitude.

The other two graphic books are from Taiwan, and in magnificent, rich color. There's an adult version, "A Pictorial Biography of Sakyamuni Buddha" by Gunapayuta, and a children's version, which is called a "concise edition." The adult version is more complete, has

more and smaller text, and the words are more complicated. But, the pictures in both books are comic art at its greatest -- very colorful and detailed.

Two new art books are now in the library: "The Evolution of the Buddha Image" by Benjamin Rowland Jr. and "Art of Nepal" by P. Pal. Also. two Bodhisattva books have been added: one about Jizo --- "The Sutra of Bodhisattva Ksitigarbha's Fundamental Vows" translated by U. T. Shih; and one about Kannon --- "Kwan Yin: Myths and Prophesies of the Chinese Goddess of Compassion" by Martin Palmer and Jay The most entertaining new Ramsav. graphic book we've received is "The Book of Zen: Freedom of the Mind", by the well-known Taiwanese cartoonist Tsai Chih Chung. The Dalai Lama. spotlighted in the recently donated Martin Scorsese film on DVD, "Kundun," is a prolific writer, and we are fortunate to have two more of his books: "Ocean of Wisdom" and "The Way to Freedom." A new addition to the psychology section is "Water Bears No Scars: Japanese Lifeways for Personal Growth" by David Reynolds --- a very engaging book on the psychological methods of Dr. Shoma Morita (who was a Japanese contemporary of Freud). These personal growth methods combine Western psychology and the psychological principles of Zen. One book that everyone is sure to appreciate is "More Old Time Kona Stories" by the Kona Japanese Civic Association. It's a very enjoyable local talk-story book.
