Library News by Clear Englebert

Keizan is known as the mother of Soto Zen (Dogen is the father) and his most famous work is "The Denkoroku" or the "Record of the Transmission of the Light" which is a history (in fifty-two chapters) of the Truth being passed from master to disciple from the time of Shakyamuni all the way to Dogen. The library has two new translations of this great work, one by Hubert Nearman and one by Thomas Cleary.
