The new arrivals are:

"The Training of the Zen Buddhist Monk"



by D. T. Suzuki. Some of Suzuki's books seem scholarly and unapproachable, but not this one. It's acknowledged to be one of Suzuki's best books, and I agree completely. It's much better than most I-was-a-Zen-monk-in-Japan kind of books, and there are lots of excellent illustrations.

"Passionate Journey: The Spiritual Autobiography of Satomi Myodo". Myodo lived from 1896 to 1978, and she attained kensho under the guidance of Yasutani Roshi. The book is translated by Sallie King.

"Mudra: A Study of Symbolic Gestures in Japanese Buddhist Sculpture" by E. Dale Saunders. We often look at a Japanese Buddhist statue and wonder, "Why are the statue's hands like they are?" or "What are the hands holding?" This excellent book will likely provide the answer.

"Buddhism: Religion of Freedom" translated by L.H. Tinh Hue and edited by Kathy Penrose. This is a perfect book for beginners.

"Suffering is Optional: Three Keys to Freedom and Joy" by Cheri Huber

"Hidden Sping: A Buddhist Woman Confronts Cancer" by Sandy Boucher

"Sakyadhita: Daughters of the Buddha" an excellent collection of essays, edited by Karma Tsomo.
