

Nehan-e Service & Potluck Lunch


Sunday, February 9 9:30 a.m.

Library News

There are three amazing new arrivals about stupas. Stupas themselves are amazing. They are reliquaries, things that hold relics, and they are often quite large and intricate.

The Symbolism of the Stupa by Adrian Snodgrass is very thick and has many drawings and black and white photographs enriching what is probably the most extensive treatise on stupas in English. The book has a hidden string attached to my jaw -- every time I open it up, my jaw drops.

Buddhist Stupas in Asia by Joe Cummings, with photography by Bill Wassman is published by Lonely Planet, a company that specializes in travel guides. This is the only book like it that the company has done and it's astonishingly beautiful, but not without a couple of quirks. At regular intervals throughout the book the publisher has included translucent tissue pages which have diagrams printed on them and look as if they are meant to overlay a photograph, but there's never a photograph for them to overlay. The pages seem to be just an odd gimmick, as is the fact that the actual cover of the book (not the dust cover) has no title or author printed anywhere on it. These quirks don't detract from the book; they just make you wonder about the publisher, "What were they thinking?"

Joruriji, Gansenji, Kaijusanji by Masashi Hamashima, Koji Ogawa, Taizo Ogawa, Tomokazu Yazawa, and Yoshio Watanabe is a slender, but oversize, book with many full-page color and black-and-white photographs of these three Japanese temples. Each of the temples has a significant pagoda, which is a type of stupa. The text is written in Japanese, but that shouldn't keep anyone from enjoying the great beauty of this wonderful book.

Library Request

The next time you're in KTA, consider making a small donation to the Daifukuji library. The library needs section dividers, and KTA sells the style of placemat we'd like to use for the purpose. The photograph shows the plastic placemat with white tropical leaves against a frosted background. The placemat will slide between books separating the sections. When the sections are well divided, the library makes more sense and is more approachable.



Donations to the library come in many ways, and usually quite unexpectedly. Recently some kind person left three lovely, excellent, hardback books in the library. Thank you, anonymous person.

Also recently, we had some book donations mailed to us by Dr. Alfred Bloom. That's a first, having donations mailed, and the books are quite substantial and rare. We are extremely grateful to Dr. Bloom.

The last time we received an unsolicited donation of books of this magnitude was around the time that I started as librarian, taking over from the founder, Lorraine Tanimoto. Michael Woodbury donated many books and among them were some rare Dharma gems. Thank you again, Michael.

This is why I'm holding evening envisioning sessions throughout the year. I'd like to know what you think. I'd like to hear about your ideas. What is your vision for our temple? In the process, we'll create a shared vision out of unique individual views, not some pie-in-the-sky vision, but one that clarifies our mission, gives us direction, and leads us to a bright future.
