

Library News

Nowhere in the scriptures is it recorded that Shakyamuni Buddha said the word "God." Instead he chose words that are impossible to attach concepts to. In the Udana Scripture he says, "There is, O Monks, an Unborn..." And that's how he referred to what other religions refer to as God. He chose words to indicate that the greatness of the Unborn is beyond our ability to grasp with ordinary thoughts. He went on to use words such as the "not-made" to indicate that what he was referring to had no creation. The library now has the Udana Scripture which is actually quite short, and it's one of two scriptures in *The Minor Anthologies of the Pali Canon, Part 2: Udana: Verses of Uplift and Itivuttaka: As It Was Said* from the Pali Text Society in England. The section I'm referring to is in chapter 8, verse 3.

The Wisdom of Buddhism by Christmas Humphreys is another new book in the library. It's a compilation of scriptures, and the very first one is the verse I referred to above. A new arrival by D. T. Suzuki, *Living by Zen*, also refers to the Unborn in an extensive section on the great Japanese Zen master Bankei. This is what Bankei said, "When you are abiding in the Unborn you are abiding in the Source itself where all the Buddhas and Patriarchs come from."

Other new arrivals are:

Fishing for the Moon and other Zen Stories by Lulu Hansen is a delightful pop-up book that was probably intended for children, but is hard to resist for anyone of any age.

Waking Up to What You Do by Diane Eshin Rizzetto is subtitled A Zen Practice for Meeting Every Situation with Intelligence and Compassion. It's a wonderful discussion of the Precepts.
