This year's celebratory theme is in conjunction with the mission's 100th anniversary year. The free event offers attendees complimentary refreshments, plus an orchid boutonniere corsage—while they last. Time is 8 a.m.-2 p.m. with the Daifukuji Taiko Drummers performing at 10 a.m.

Enjoy an elaborate and colorful display of live blooming cattleya, cymbidium, dendrobium, phalaenopsis, miltonia, vanda and more. Cameras are welcome. In addition this



year's show will have a display of orchid-themed vases and a sampling of ways to integrate the plants into lanai décor. Amid orchids, relax on benches while browsing through orchid-themed magazines and books.

#### There are a wide variety of new arrivals:

*Receiving the Buddhist Precepts* printed by Shasta Abbey is a succinct 24-page pamphlet which is very appropriate for anyone who has taken the Precepts or is

considering doing so. "The keeping of the Precepts leads to peace within the heart, which leads to true joy, which leads to gratitude which is unbounded, which gives birth to generosity of spirit and generosity of spirit gives birth to absolute trust."

*The Buddhabhasita Dasabhadra Karmamarga* is a very short sermon given by Shakyamuni Buddha, and is apparently the original basis of the Precepts.

The Six Perfections by Dale Wright is a book that goes hand-in-hand with the Precepts.

*Tassajara Moments* by Tova Green is a delightful 48-page book of poems and musings of her time before becoming ordained as a priest at Tassajara in 2003. It is dedicated to Mayumi Oda, and one of the acknowledgements is to Mushim Ikeda-Nash.

There are two interesting new books in the Death section: *Sleeping, Dreaming, and Dying* by the Dalai Lama, and *Loving and Dying* by Visuddhacara.



#### Summer Greetings from Rev. Jiko

Dear Daifukuji members and friends,

I send you my Obon greetings with best wishes for your health and happiness. Summer is here with its delightful brightness, enveloping warmth, and playful energy. At Daifukuji, I'm enjoying listening to the taiko groups practicing their Bon Dance song "Matsuri" and watching the bon dancers hone their dancing skills for the upcoming season. It's nice to see that quite a few men have joined the circle. The dance workshops taught by Ruriko Hayashi and Linda Asato were well



attended. People were excited to learn some new dances. In the weeks to come, dance instructor Winifred Kimura will be reviewing all of the dances, so if bon dancing is your thing or if it's something you've been wanting to try, come out and join the fun.

Inside the temple, I am enjoying the usual sweet fragrance of incense and flowers, along with the crisp smell of new carpet and the woodsy scent of freshly shaven toba boards, which, for me, is the fragrance of Obon. Over the years I've seen how Obon is important on many levels. On a personal level, Obon is about remembering one's departed loved ones and ancestors and saying thank you to them. On the family level, it's about strengthening one's 'ohana through prayer, ritual, and the recognition of shared roots. On the sangha level, it's about supporting the hatsubon families (those who lost a loved one within the past year) who still may be grieving. On the community level, it's about people from all walks of life coming together for an evening of dancing, taiko, and fellowship. And on what may be its deepest spiritual level, Obon is about feeding the hungry spirits, including our own hungry spirit which yearns for peace & happiness. I love the sutra *Kanromon (Ambrosia Gate sutra)* which is recited at the Obon service. In it, one finds these lines:

We pray that every one of you, having received this food of ours, offers it in turn to all buddhas, holy ones, and sentient beings throughout all realms of empty space, that all may be satisfied. We also pray that your bodies, conveyed by the dharani-food, may leave suffering behind and gain liberation; that you may attain the joy of birth in heavens; that you may, in accordance with your wishes, be delivered to one of the pure lands in the ten directions; that you may give rise to the thought of awakening, practice the path to awakening, and in the future become buddhas; that you may never backslide; and that whoever first attains the way may vow to lead the others to liberation as well. We also pray that day and night without cease you shall protect us and completely answer our prayers. (From Sutras & Gathas: In Harmony With Buddha)

On whatever level Obon speaks to you, may yours be a summer of peace, healing, and awakening.

Namu kie butsu. Namu kie ho. Namu kie so.

We take refuge in the Buddha. We take refuge in the Dharma. We take refuge in the Sangha.
