


Zazenkai News

Library News

We have some very special new arrivals-five bound volumes of The Wheel which is a famous series of pamphlets from the Buddhist Publication Society in Sri Lanka. Let's just say it's a major acquisition! Here's the story of how this set came to our library. I'm a member of the Friends of the Library Kona (thanks to Pamela Wang); in fact, I'm the special pricer for items that are more valuable. Marie Kober is my immediate boss at FOLK and about three years ago she showed me a recently donated box with these five books in it. "What should we do with these?" I realized that a Dharma Gate had just opened in front of my eyes, and I immediately blurted out, "Oh, you should give these to the Daifukuji Library." "Great! Take them," was her quick reply, and I soon saw why-the books were all close to falling apart. I showed them to our library staff here at the temple, and nobody was eager to dive into the repair job that was obviously needed. We made a couple of meager attempts at repairing them, but we just didn't have the expertise. They sat in our cubby at the temple until this past February when I took them to Denise Stromberg, the head librarian at the Kailua Library. We discussed the condition of the books with Joyce Pearson, the main volunteer book repairer. Joyce said she would use special glue and a special book press and fix them. She also used an immense amount of talent and patience, and it took her about a week. We offer the merit of having these books in our library to Joyce Pearson and Denise Stromberg (for allowing the work to be done there).

This set of books (the first one hundred Wheel pamphlets that BPS published) is special because it is very authoritative and very interesting, and it's divided into bit-size chunks. The individual pamphlets are typically 30 to 100 pages long. Just to browse the table of contents of the volumes is quite a journey into the depth and variety of Buddhist Dharma.

The Significance of Hanamatsuri

What is *Hanamatsuri? Hanamatsuri*, a Japanese word which means "Flower Festival," is an observance of the Buddha's birth. At Daifukuji, this service involves the chanting of the sutras, the singing of gathas, and the pouring of sweet tea over a small statue of the baby Buddha by the members of the sangha. The baby Buddha is set inside a miniature pavilion called a *hanamido*, which is adorned with fresh flowers and foliage to recreate the garden of Lumbini, in which Prince Siddhartha Gautama, the buddha-to-be,

was born around 563 B.C.E. in what is modern-day Nepal.

The pouring of sweet tea or *amacha* is symbolic of the sweet rain that is said to have fallen from the heavens at the time of the Buddha's birth. It is a lovely ceremony in which young and old alike participate, a way in which all can honor the birth of a great human being, whose teachings have spanned over two millennia and spread across the face of the Earth, bringing peace, joy, and liberation to many people. Empires have risen and fallen, civilizations have come and gone, and advances in science and technology have changed the world. Yet, almost 2,600 years after the Buddha's birth, his teachings, the Dharma, which he expounded with compassion, is what is being studied and practiced by millions of Buddhists today. We are among those who have had the good fortune of encountering such wondrous teachings.

Services such as *Hanamatsuri* connect us to the Buddha and to the Dharma within the context of the Sangha. In essence, we are taking refuge in the Three Treasures, which are the foundation of the life of a Buddhist. When we pour sweet tea over the baby Buddha, we not only honor our great teacher & resolve to practice the Dharma, but also water the seeds of buddhahood within ourselves, for we are baby buddhas in the flower gardens of Hawaii. May we aspire to live with loving-friendliness and compassion and walk softly upon the earth. Happy Buddha Day!

10. Workers/members' vehicles should be parked in the cemetery area. Carpool if possible. If you need your car parked, please fill out and attach an identification tag to your keys for our parking staff. Key identification tags will be provided.

11. Lunch will be provided to all workers. Meal tickets will be issued to each Unit Chair by Avis Yamamoto.

12. At closing, each unit is responsible for cleaning its respective areas. Please assist other units as needed.

We are excited to announce that Daifukuji will be participating in the Blue Zones Project. The Blue Zones Project is about discovering the secrets in the

Blue Zones around the world and incorporating those practices in our communities. Across the country, businesses, organizations, communities and individuals are using these practices to help promote a healthy and happy community.

But what is a Blue Zone? A Blue Zone is an area where there is a high percentage of centenarians. This term became popular based on the book, *Blue Zones* by longevity expert Dan Buettner. Buettner researched where individuals lived well over the age of 100 and were still active. He found five hot spots around the world where individuals had active long-lived lives.

Those five regions are:

Sardinia, Italy Ikaria, Greece Okinawa, Japan Nicola, Costa Rica Loma Linda, California

Buettner discovered that these five regions had certain things in common that attributed to their longevity. These long lived communities focused particularly on lifestyle, community and spirituality.
