Let's begin 2008 with prayers for peace, happiness, good health, and safety. At the midnight service you may participate in the ringing of the temple bell (joya no kane) and enjoy hot soba noodles. Tea and sweets will be served after the morning service on New Year's Day.

Hawaii Kannon omamori and ofuda will be available at both services and throughout the month of January. Omamori are Buddhist charms that invite the blessings of safety. happiness, and peace. They can be hung in one's car or boat or carried in one's bag. Lovingly made by Kay Sugai, Matsue Ikeda, & Sakae Oshima, the lauhala omamori are very special and found only at our temple. Woven from the leaves of the hala tree, they are fragrant and biodegradable. Ofuda are prayer cards that one hangs in one's house, shop, or office to invite the blessings of the buddhas and bodhisattvas. The 2008 ofuda features a line drawing of the Kannon-sama that graces our temple, along with the words "May you be safe. May you be happy. May you live in peace. Namu Kanzeon Bosatsu." A donation of \$5 per omamori and \$2 per ofuda is requested.

Abundant blessings will be bestowed upon all. May we greet the new year 2008 with clear minds and calm hearts.

2007 Temple Report

(This report was presented at the general membership meeting on December 9, 2007.)

Dear members and friends,

Thanks to your help and generous contributions, the temple fared well in 2007 and the Board worked hard to insure that temple operations ran smoothly and improvements were made where needed. These are the main things that happened:

- 1. A new stonewall was built at a cost of \$30,147. (We received \$11,700 in donations from our members.) Our old wall was severely damaged in the October 2006 earthquake. Colorful flowers were planted to brighten the inside border of the wall. Thank you to everyone who generously contributed to our stonewall reconstruction fund.
- 2. Because so many graves were damaged by the earthquake, the Board had to create guidelines for the exhumation of graves. (Please see Rev. Jiko for the guidelines.) We thank Shirlene Yoneyama and Harold Murata for a professionally-done cemetery damage report. We are requesting that damages to individual graves be repaired by the families responsible for those graves. The temple will continue to work on the overall improvement of the cemetery.
- 3. Two new refrigerators were purchased for the hall kitchen. The old freezer was removed, and the damaged flooring replaced.
- 4. Obon: Thanks to the hard work of our members, we have a new yagura along with a new skirt to go around it. This cost us \$4,700.

Four new speakers were situated inside the yagura. The temple invited Bon dance instructor Ruriko Hayashi who came from Honolulu to give us dance instruction.

- 5. A successful bazaar which added \$15,482 to the temple building fund was held on May 20th. The date of the 2008 bazaar will be announced soon.
- 6. Dr. Julia Crawford created a beautiful picture book about our temple which contains many nice photos of our members. This book is available for \$30. Please see Rev. Jiko for a copy.
- 7. In August a communication workshop was given by Rev. Joshin Althouse, and a tokudo ceremony held for Jill Teiho Wagner. We thank Teiho and also Ven Rabjee for their service to our Sangha and to Rev. Jiko.
- 8. Two of our members turned 100 years old this year. We congratulate Taketo Sasaki and Shizuko Teshima.
- 9. A wonderful new group has formed to honor and provide service to our kupunas. Coordinated by Vivian Ontai and Reiko Sekine, "Lei Wili O Na Kupuna" Project Dana meets once a month for fun, fellowship, & great meals. Funded by Daifukuji and donations received, this program is provided free for our senior members. \$1,000 was provided by our temple to start this program.
- 10. The access to the nokotsudo (columbarium) has been improved at a cost of \$1,700. The ground has been leveled and a new surface put down. A new handrail and an additional step were added for safety.
- 11. There are 15 different groups that regularly meet and practice at our temple. The aikido, yoga, Baikako, Sangha Sisters, and adult taiko groups are accepting new members. The Kids & Teen sanghas also accept new families throughout the year.
- 12. The new year's party committee is working hard to plan a wonderful party for our members and friends. The Board has decided that the party be an alcohol-free event due to liability concerns. In this day and age, organizations such as ours have to be very careful. We ask for everyone's understanding.
- 13. 30 new members (17 new families) joined our Daifukuji sangha in 2007. We welcome these members warmly & thank them for joining.

- 14. In 2008 we will be expanding our meditation and dharma study program. Please read details in this newsletter.
- 15. In January, along with the membership forms for 2008, Rev. Jiko will be sending out a brochure describing the Soto Zen Buddhist Lay Confirmation Ceremony which will give our members a chance to receive the precepts, as well as a Buddhist name.

I wish to express my heartfelt appreciation to the Daifukuji Board of Directors for the time, energy, and guidance they've provided, and to all of our members and supporters who make our temple the beautiful place that it is today.

2008 Daifukuji Soto Mission Japan Tour

May 28 – June 9, 2008

It is still possible for you to join our 2008 Daifukuji Soto Mission Japan Tour. We have 18 confirmed passengers and can accommodate up to 32. The cost of this tour is dependent upon the number of people going. (It will be somewhere between \$3,282 - \$3,700 per person. This includes air and ground transportation, admission to the various sites, some meals, the services of an English-speaking guide escort, porterage, a group photo, and hotel accommodations based on 2 persons to a hotel room.) Rev. Jiko is collecting a deposit of \$100 per person made payable to Kobayashi Travel.

The itinerary looks fantastic – a well-balanced combination of visits to famous temples, scenic spots, cultural events, and unique shopping opportunities. We will be going to Eiheiji Monastery which was founded by Dogen Zenji and Sojiji Soin Temple which was founded by Keizan Zenji and seeing Rev. Tamiya and his family and temple in Niigata City. We'll even have a chance to have dinner on Sado Island with a group of Taishoji Soto Mission members who will also be touring Japan! Taiko lovers will enjoy a performance by Gojinjyo Daiko in Wajima and visiting Asano Taiko where taiko drums are made. 2008 Dharma Study Sessions

There will be two five-week series of Dharma Study sessions at Daifukuji in 2008. The first series will be February 21 through March 27, excepting March 6. The second series will be August 14 through September 11. The sessions are all on Thursdays from 7:00 pm to 8:30 pm. Each session begins with twenty minutes of seated meditation. There is a \$25 suggested donation per series (\$5 per class), but donations are not required. All ages are welcome, and pre-registration is encouraged.

The focus of the first series will be the Buddhist precepts. These succinct sentences were passed down through Dogen Zenji and Keizan Zenji to guide us from the behavior which creates more suffering for ourselves and others. The precepts begin with taking refuge in the Three Treasures - Buddha, Dharma, and Sangha. Following that are the Three Pure Precepts -Cease from evil, Do only good, Do good for others. Then there are the Ten Great Precepts: Do not kill, Do not steal, Do not covet, Do not say that which is untrue, Do not sell the wine of delusion, Do not speak against others, Do not be proud of yourself and devalue others, Do not be mean in giving either Dharma or wealth, Do not be angry, Do not debase the Three Treasures. This version of the precepts is from Dogen Zenji's Shushogi chapter of the Shobogenzo, translated by Roshi Jiyu Kennett in Zen is Eternal Life. There are many translations of these Dharma jewels - shedding light on their various facets.

A personal note:

I was ordained as a Soto Lay person in 1976 at Shasta Abbey in northern California. At one time I was a lay minister, and at one time I was a monk. I have never been a Buddhist teacher, and am not qualified to be, but I can do the two things that Rev. Jiko has asked of me: help with the selection of scriptures to study, and facilitate the Dharma Study sessions. I've been a professional bookseller and librarian for most of my life, and this has made me aware of the vast number of the Buddhist scriptures and their various translations.

Buddhist scriptures have been written through thousands of years in various circumstances. Some of the writings from India were originally oral and are repetitive and rich in imagery. Our modern ears are not used to this type of writing and they can be difficult. Other writings can have their meanings hidden behind code words. This happened a lot in China, where there were at least three bloody repressions of Buddhism, when it was seen as a foreign influence. To decode these poems and scriptures properly takes a translator who has had the same enlightenment experience as the scripture writer. Then there are some scriptures which were written simply and manage to reach our hearts even in a clumsy translation. *The Dhammapada* is an example of a stunningly clear scripture. To read it is to love and cherish it. My favorite translation is by P. Lal:

There is only one eternal law: Hate never destroys hate; only love does.

Some never see the point of disciplining themselves. Others do; they are the wise ones; they do not argue.

Sojiji Soin Restoration Fund Drive

In March, 2007 a major earthquake hit Wajima, Japan and destroyed much of the Sojiji Soin Temple, which has great historical, cultural, and religious value for Soto Zen Buddhists since this was where the spread of Soto teachings began. (The Daifukuji group will visit this temple on their Japan tour.)

Restoration efforts have begun in Japan and are expected to take ten years to complete at an estimated cost of about \$10,000,000. The Hawaii Soto Mission Association has already contributed \$5,000 to the Restoration Fund. Soto Mission of Hawaii has donated \$10,000.

The Hawaii Soto Mission Association at its 2007 Fall Meeting decided to begin a Restoration Fund Drive to further help the cause. Each Soto family is asked to contribute to this fund in the spirit of *dana* or whole-hearted giving. The amount of the donation is not as important as the spirit with which the donation is made. Even a donation of \$5 sends the message of aloha from Soto members in Hawaii to Soto Dharma friends in Japan. To participate in this fund drive, please send a check made payable to <u>Daifukuji Soto Mission</u>, with a note on the check that specifies "Restoration Fund Drive." Your name will be included on the donor list that will be sent to Sojiji Soin.
