Our Daifukuji family sangha is a very special group which gathers on Sunday mornings (see calendar for schedule) to experience the simple joys of a child-friendly Sunday service held inside the Kannon Hall.

With the littlest children sitting on their parents' and older siblings' laps, the group, led by Jiko Sensei and Teiho Sensei, are taught how to sit in meditation "just like the Buddha." Dharma songs are sung to ukulele and piano accompaniment, and simple Buddhist teachings shared. The children themselves volunteer to lead the Kannonsama prayer.

Once in a while, special arts and crafts activities are done following the services, such as the creating of vision and "Mara" boards last Sunday, an activity inspired by Ryan Jigaku's dharma talk. On September 19th, instead of gathering at the temple for a service, the family sangha will be taking a field trip to Teiho's zendo and tree nursery to learn about nature and ecology.

There is a \$15 donation to the Daifukuji Sunday School that is collected annually when family registration forms are handed out at the beginning of a new Dharma school

year. This donation is used for field trips & refreshments.

A Letter to My Ancestors *(Written and shared by Jiko Sensei at the 2010 Betsuin & Taishoji Obon services)*

Dear Family Ancestors,

Obon is here and you are in my thoughts once more. On to-ba memorial tablets, upon which the scent of the forest lingers still, I've written your names with great reverence. With brush dipped in black ink, I have painted the ancient prayer: "May all hungry beings be spiritually nourished, and may generations of family ancestors attain enlightenment," all the while recalling your good deeds, your hard work, your grit, your tears, your love. Because of you, I am here. I can feel you -- all of you -- in my bones, my marrow, my cells. You, who departed long ago, have left your imprint upon my body, my being. We are connected, you and I, in a world without boundaries.

Grandfather Kaneshaburo, you who came from Nagano, Japan, and died before I was born, I especially pray for you now, and am so sorry you were killed in an internment camp in Oklahoma. Matsuura Sensei was there. He said that you were playing hanafuda, when a faraway look entered your eyes. You dropped your cards and said you were going home, home to Hawai'i. As you ran toward the barbed-wire fence, your friends tried to stop you. "Don't shoot!" they yelled. "He's lost his mind." But, the sentry fired his gun,

and, Grandfather, you came home, a pile of ashes, to the tear-stained faces of your wife and eleven children. Grandfather Kaneshaburo, you and I have never met, yet I pray for you now, at Obon.

Grandmother Matsu, how frightened you must have been when the police took your husband away to be interned the night Pearl Harbor was bombed. How many tears you must have shed when he died in a distant land, never to return to Kona or to you, -- you, a strong woman who gave birth to twelve, and died in your sleep with your youngest child asleep beside you. Matsu Obaachan, you, too, died before I was born. I think of you now, at Obon.

Grandfather Kinjiro, I speak to you now. Have you returned, following the light of the chochin swaying in the summer breeze? Long ago, you left Fukushima for a new land, labored in the pineapple fields of Kunia, married, raised a family, opened a store in Wahiawa, sent medicine and clothing to orphans during the war. You died when I was a young child, yet I see you still, writing the Hannya Shingyo on brown paper bags, over and over again, until death swept you away to the Other Shore.

Gya-te gya-te hara gya-te, hara so gya-te bo ji sowaka hannya shingyo...

Grandmother Haruko, you were the joy of my heart, the joy of everyone's hearts. With an apron tied around your waist, your white hair held neatly in a hair net, you had an ever-ready smile, a deep and humble bow. I can hear you still, chanting the Hannya

Shingyo at dawn, intoning the Nembutsu at night. "Gimme five!," you'd say, laughing, with an outstretched palm, your grandchildren clustered around you, calling "Grandma, Grandma." Obaachan, you are in my heart at Obon.



*Dear Mom and Dad,
I offer this incense for you.
On trails of fragrant smoke
may it rise,
swirling in the*

summer breeze, finding you where the white lotus blooms. You were everything to me.

Dad, you were working all the time, day and night, to keep our family business going. The times we spent together, hauling the trash to the dump, tending the fire for our furo, going to Kannon services at our temple, were all so precious to me, especially since you died when I was just nine. Dad, after you died, Mom taught me your precepts name, which you received when Koho Zenji came to Daifukuji in 1960. Renpoin Zenshin Doryu Jo Za. As a child, I often recited your beautiful name. Dad, I recite it for you now, at Obon.

Renpoin Zenshin Doryu Jo Za.

Mom, it was you who dressed me in a bright yukata, made me a happi coat with pink flowers, and danced with me around the yagura. You loved Obon, and so do I. You are still my bright star, my guiding light. Mom, my life is good because of you. Dance with me in spirit. The season we love is here.

*The Buddhist priests are chanting,
the taiko drummers, drumming,
and round and round the yagura
the people dance with joy.
We celebrate our oneness,
elevate our consciousness,
promote family togetherness,
re-dedicate our lives.*

*Let us serve all humanity,
let us heal our planet's wounds,
let us build a bright tomorrow,
and,
dear ancestors,
let us always
remember...
you.*
